
Rhode Island is Making Economic Progress



- 5.1% unemployment rate as of December 2015
 - Biggest year-over year drop of any state
- Over 8,000 jobs created in 2015
 - Highest annual job gain total since 2000
- FY 2017 deficit of \$49.5 M down 74% from FY 2016 deficit of \$190.4M projected when Governor Raimondo took office



- Opportunity for All

Key Features of Governor's FY 2017 Budget



- Invests at record levels in our educational system and workforce
- Closes an estimated deficit of \$49.5 million, down from the projected FY 2016 deficit of \$190.4 million
- Introduces no broad-based tax increases
- Focuses on growing advanced industries
- Provides incentives, tax cuts and regulatory improvements to make it easier to do business in RI

Key Features of Governor's FY 2017 Budget



- Protects the health and safety of our residents
- Modernizes government practices and provides tools to combat fraud and waste
- Makes fiscally responsible, tough decisions to fix the fundamentals of government
- Continues to provide predictability for businesses through pension and progressive Medicaid reform

Skills That Matter: Strengthen Neighborhood Schools



- Invest in School Aid Fully funds the school aid formula with an additional \$33.4 million
 - Includes Funding Formula Working Group recommendations
 - Adjusts funds to school districts and charter schools to reflect local costs and conditions; includes a Density Aid adjustment for public schools of choice
 - Invests additional funds for students with special needs (\$2.0M); creates an English Language Learners weighting component to the formula (\$2.5M)

• Early Childhood-

- \$1.2 million more for early childhood formula categorical program
- \$1.6 million (DHS and RIDE) to sustain programs from federal Race to the Top Early Learning Challenge Grant

Skills That Matter: Strengthen Neighborhood Schools



- Innovation & Empowerment Fund \$1.0 million in planning grants
- **Leadership Development** \$1.75 million for professional development for teachers and principals
- Expand Computer Science Programs -\$260,000

Skills That Matter: Strengthen Neighborhood Schools



- **School Facilities** \$80.0 million appropriation for construction & renovation, including \$9.1 million for School Building Authority
- School Modernization Bond \$40.0 million general obligation bond to renovate and modernize school facilities especially those focused on immediate health and safety and those investing in STEAM learning spaces
- **School Budget Transparency** Require each public school to provide its actual budget online

Skills That Matter: Prepare Students for College or Career



- **P-TECH Program** \$0.5 million more (total of \$1.4 million) to expand from three to at least five P-TECH schools
- **Prepare RI** \$1.3 million in funding for free, universal dual and concurrent enrollment, allowing eligible students to earn college credits
- **SAT/PSAT** \$500,000 to make tests free for all sophomores and juniors in public high school to increase participation

Skills That Matter: Make College More Affordable



- Increased Funding to URI, RIC, CCRI \$17.0 million more, including \$10.0 million in capital funding, to avoid a tuition increase
- **Joint Nursing Education Center** \$3.5 million for Base Rent, Tenant Improvement Rent and equipment.
- **RI Promise Scholarships** Continued funding of \$10.0 million for last-dollar scholarships

Skills That Matter: Keep Talent in RI



- **Wavemaker Fellowship** Increase to \$5.0 million to expand loan forgiveness program
- **Ocean State Grad Grant** Continues funding through RI Housing to provide recent college graduates with up to \$7,000 in down payment assistance on a first home

Skills That Matter: Workforce Development



- White House's TechHire \$2.0 million to provide access to coding boot camps and online courses for rapid training. Goal is to train and place 2,000 Rhode Islanders in IT jobs in five years
- **Real Jobs RI** Reprioritize existing workforce dollars to align training efforts with employer needs

Jobs That Pay: Foster Innovation



 Expand Research & Development Tax Credit — Creates refundable tax credit for businesses committing to R&D in the state and investing in plant, equipment, or personnel

Commerce Programs

- **Small Business Innovation Research** \$1.0 million increase in state match for federal Small Business Innovation Research program
- Impact Faculty Total of \$2.75 million to support hiring faculty with record of commercializing research

Jobs That Pay: Foster Innovation



- **Industry Competitive Cluster Grants** \$1.25 million to create incentives for an industry sector to work together to solve problems, exchange ideas, and develop talent
- **Innovation Vouchers** \$1.5 million to provide grants to businesses to fund R&D assistance from a Rhode Island university, research center, or medical center

Jobs That Pay: Make It Easier To Do Business



- No Broad-Based Tax Changes
- Reduce Unemployment Insurance Taxes Expected annual savings of \$30.0 million to employers
- **Combat TDI Fraud** Improve the claims review process and enhance information sharing across state government benefit programs. Requires claims to be filed within 90 days of illness or injury.

Jobs That Pay: Make It Easier To Do Business



- **Rebuild Rhode Island Tax Credit** \$20.6 million to support high-return real estate development projects that encourage construction and job creation
- **First Wave Closing Funds** \$5.0 million to provide last-dollar financing for priority projects
- **Building & Fire Code Permitting** \$250,0000 to expedite fire and building permit review processes for priority projects

Jobs That Pay: Make It Easier To Do Business



- **Modernize State Regulations** \$700,000 to create an online, user-friendly, searchable state code of regulations
- **Expand E-permitting** \$500,000 to increase number of participating communities from 10 to 25
- **Air Service Development** \$1.5 million to develop new air service routes for T.F. Green

Jobs That Pay: Modernize Infrastructure



- **School Building Authority** \$9.1 million in FY 2017; \$40.0 million general obligation bond
- **RhodeWorks** invest in our neglected infrastructure
- Other Infrastructure
 - **Stormwater Upgrades** \$3.0 million (in Healthy Communities bond)
 - **Brownfield Remediation** \$5.0 million (in Healthy Communities bond)
 - Energy Efficiency extend Renewable Energy Fund surcharge to 2022 to support renewable energy projects

Jobs That Pay: Modernize Infrastructure



- **Housing Opportunity Fund** \$1.0 million general revenue funding and \$40 million general obligation bond to finance the production and preservation of housing for young workers, seniors, and other residents
- **Main Street RI Streetscape Improvements** –\$1.0 million to upgrade streetscapes in local business districts and attract businesses and customers

Opportunities For All: Money in People's Pockets



- Minimum Wage Increase to \$10.10/hour
- **Earned Income Tax Credit** Increase from 12.5 percent to 15.0 percent
- Home Care & Developmental Disability Services Wages Increase health home worker wages by approximately 7.0 percent to expand home-based services; raise for private sector developmentally disabled services workers by approximately 4.0 percent

Opportunities For All: Keep People Safe & Healthy



- Assist Senior Citizens
 - \$600,000 increase in grant funding to senior centers in all communities
 - \$550,000 in continued funding for Meals on Wheels
- **Combat Lead Poisoning** \$187,000 for prevention and case management efforts
- Combat Opioid Overdoses Supports recommendations of Overdose & Prevention Task Force
 - **o** \$2.5 million to Corrections for medication-assisted treatment programs
 - \$740,000 to Health & Human Services (with \$760,000 Medicaid match) for expanded access to naloxone, Prescription Monitoring Program and peer recovery coaches

Opportunities For All: Keep People Safe & Healthy



 Cybersecurity – \$800,000 for priority IT infrastructure upgrades, executive branch training, and a cybersecurity director

Criminal Justice Reform

- \$1.3 million for Justice Reinvestment working group recommendations, including risk assessments and more effective probation supervision
- \$500,000 for Pay-for-Success project to reduce recidivism

Climate Change & Environmental Enforcement –

- \$100,000 for URI Coastal Resiliency Center
- Extend Renewable Energy Fund surcharge; broaden net metering law
- Increase enforcement staffing at Department of Environmental Management

Municipal Fiscal Health



- **Fully Fund PILOT** Additional \$1.9 million fully funds Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) for first time since FY 2008
- **Municipal Transparency Portal** \$200,000 for an online website for collection and dissemination of municipal fiscal data and reports
- **Reform Property Revaluation Schedule** Extends property tax revaluation schedule cycle from nine years to fifteen years; municipalities will conduct updates every five years, instead of three, promoting efficiencies
- Neighborhood Schools
 — Continued commitment to school funding formula and building renovation

Providing Value, Improving Care



- **Reinventing Medicaid** Continues FY 2016 efforts to support value-based approach to payments. Saves \$39.0 million in FY 2017, including \$20.3 million from Unified Health Infrastructure Program
- **Child Welfare** Bring placement services in-house and increase foster care subsidy to decrease costly residential placements
- **Developmental Disability Services** Save \$10.8 million by moving clients to less restrictive settings; reinvests \$7.0 million for service providers to develop home- and community-based programs
- **Eleanor Slater Hospital** Management improvements and efficiencies and consolidation of services to yield \$4.1 million in savings

Effective & Efficient Government



- Electronic Time & Attendance
 Replacing paper-based process with web-based system for scheduling and reporting. Expected to save \$350,000 for Corrections, a pilot agency, from replacement of other system.
- Online Voter Registration & Voting System Upgrades \$130,000 for online registration and \$1.3 million new funding to replace voting equipment.
- **Medical Marijuana Regulation & Enforcement** Creates plant tagging system and fee to improve oversight and enforcement. Seeks greater fee parity between compassion centers and caregivers, and yields \$8.4 million net general revenue and restricted receipt funding.

Effective & Efficient Government



- **Fraud Detection System** Coordinated interdepartmental effort to detect and prevent fraud; IT Investment of \$1.5 million expected to gain \$5.0 million in savings/revenue
- **Utility Savings** \$2.6 million through natural gas commodity pricing

Deficit Reduction



Improved Enforcement –

- Internal Revenue Code Audit Identify companies that have used intercompany transactions to avoid taxes. Expected to raise \$6.7 million
- Nexus Program Identify out-of-state companies that do business in Rhode Island & collect appropriate taxes; expected to raise \$1.0 million
- **Cigarette Tax** Raise cigarette tax by 25 cents, from \$3.75 to \$4.00 per pack, increasing revenues to by \$7.1 million while improving the health of Rhode Islanders

Summary

- Governor Raimondo's revised FY 2016 general revenue spending plan is \$24.5 million more than enacted.
- Caseload estimates up by \$14.8 million.
- UHIP Project expenses up by \$10.0 million
- Reappropriations of \$6.9 million
- Net offsetting reductions of \$7.2 million
- Projected FY 2016 surplus of \$81.2 million.

FY 2017 Budget Statement

General Revenues

- Projected Opening Surplus of \$81.7 million is \$86.4 million less than what is built into the FY 2016 Revised Budget.
- FY 2017 General Revenue expenditures are projected to increase by \$100.3 million, or 2.8% over FY 2016 revised spending.
- Resolves a projected \$49.5 million deficit.



FY 2017 Recommended All Funds Expenditures by Source


